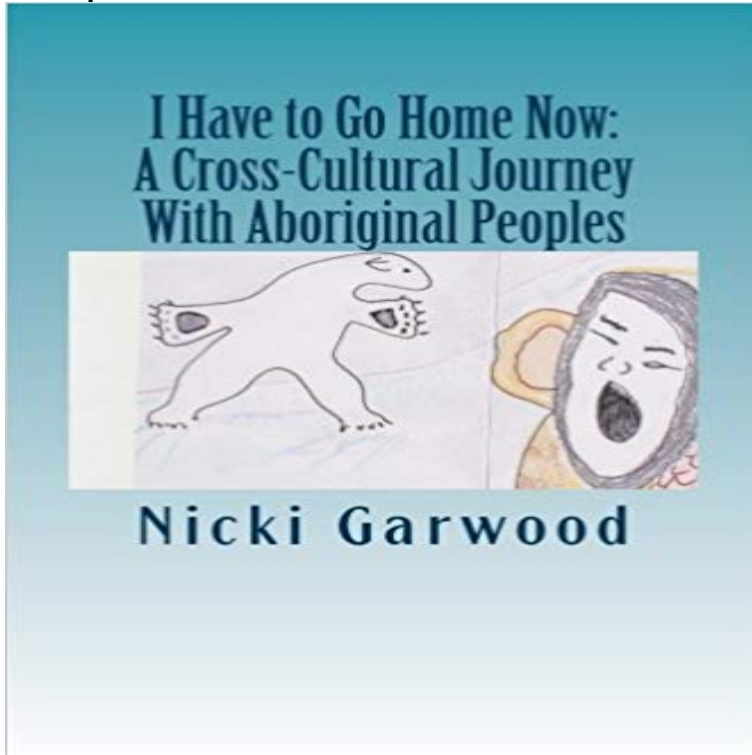


I Have to Go Home Now: A Cross-Cultural Journey With Aboriginal Peoples

The material describes the clinical realities of Aboriginal experience, promoting understanding of Aboriginal issues and supporting important discussions on treatment and policy-making. A therapeutic healing bush-camp for male Aboriginal ex-offenders serves as the background to the discussions that emerge from the text.

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
